

FEATURED ARTIST Hon Chew Hee

As the year starts, we thought we'd take a look back to our HWS origins. Our organization was founded by local artist Hon Chew Hee whose work melded influences from his native China with American and European traditions.

Hon Chew Hee was born in 1906 in Kahului, Maui to Chinese parents. He loved to draw since childhood. One of his earliest memories was seeing Halley's Comet when he was about 4.

In 1911 his family moved from Maui to Kauai and then Oahu. The next year he moved with his mother and siblings to China to his mother's home village. He attended school and received his

first

training in Chinese brush painting. After graduating in 1920, Hee returned to Honolulu where he began school again, learning English and other subjects as a first grader despite his age. He later attended McKinley High School but left before earning his diploma. After high school—when he was in his

twenties—Hee sailed to San Francisco where he had a sister living. He enrolled

as an art student at California School

of Fine Arts and quickly excelled. After earning his degree, he returned to China but soon came back to Honolulu. He and painter Isami Doi began an arts education center at the Nuuanu YMCA; Hee taught painting and calligraphy.


After December 7, 1941, Hee joined the Navy Yard at Pearl Harbor and worked there throughout World War II. In 1946 he married and during 1948-49 Hee and his wife both went to New York City where Marjorie studied at Columbia and Hee studied at the Art Students League. Hee then went on to study art in Paris with Fernand Leger and Andre L'hote. Before returning to the States, he had a one-man show in Paris.

Hee returned first to New York, then to California where he spent two semesters at the California School of Arts and Crafts. Back in Honolulu by 1959, Hee began teaching through the University of Hawaii's Continuing Education department, a post he stayed at for 12 years teaching watercolor and oil painting.

In 1962, Hee founded the Hawaii Watercolor and Serigraph Society (which later dropped "Serigraph"). Earlier in San Francisco he had founded the Chinese Art Association.

In addition to his painting and print work, Hee completed six murals for the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. The best known are in the Hilo Hospital and the Honolulu International Airport Inter-Island Terminal. Hee lived in Kaneohe; he died in 1993.





We felt we had won the lottery when we secured tickets to see the Vermeer exhibition at the **Rijksmuseum** in Amsterdam last May. My husband has a penchant for "quests." His latest, borrowed from a friend, was to see all of the paintings of Johannes Vermeer. He snagged 5 of the 29 by the end of 2022 (MoMA, the Frick, etc.). THEN a longtime friend who reads the New York Times told him about the "once in forever" Vermeer retrospective at the **Rijksmuseum**. Of course, by the time word reached us, the tickets had evaporated. But wait! The museum announced they would release additional tickets at a future date. They did. We were lucky enough to jump online in time to buy a couple, and the quest accelerated.

Understand, an impromptu trip abroad to see some paintings is not in our usual sphere of vacation planning. But having done it once, though, we'll do it again!

Instead of allocating a single afternoon for a quick museum visit, we had a whole week! We felt like celebrities with time to take as long as we wanted to see these superb, famous paintings up close. It really did feel personal.

Since we were "in the neighborhood"— Amsterdam—we took the opportunity to visit the **Van Gogh Museum** and take a docent-led tour through the masterworks at the **Rijksmuseum**. The train ride to **Den Hague** to visit "*The Girl with the Pearl Earring*" took us through tulip fields—just at the end of their brilliant season. Another day took us to Delft, the site of "*The Little Street.*" As an aside, train stations in the Netherlands are their own grand art installations!

There was certainly magic to visiting the paintings in the air and land of their origins. Where shall we go next???

2024 HWS Members' Show - FLOW

Get your entries in! The 2024 HWS Members' Show FLOW-The Liquid World of Watercolor and Glass is open for submittals. Prospectus and entry are available on the HWS website: https://www.hawaiiwatercolorsociety. org/2024-members-show. The exhibition will be held at the Downtown Art Center, second floor, on Nu'uanu Avenue and will be open for visitors April 2-27. Entries to the show must be submitted online by February 16, 2024 HST.

There are special requirements for this show. The show will be restricted to watercolor only with opaque media limited to less than 1% of the painted surface. The specifics are within the prospectus.

The show will also feature the works of 11 invited glass artists. Their work will be exhibited along with the selected watercolor paintings. HWS benefits greatly from sharing the space with this 3D media as it brings additional visitors to the gallery and potential increased sales for all.

The show will be juried by **Dan Marshall**, a nationally renowned watercolor artist, demonstrator, and instructor located in Denver, Colorado. He has been featured in and written articles for *Watercolor Artist, Southwestern Art, Plein Air Magazine* and OutdoorPainter.com and has received multiple awards from juried shows and invitational events. He has previously served as a juror for the National Watercolor Society, the Colorado Watercolor Society and the Laguna Plein Air Painters Association.

Calling for Paint-Out Locations

Tips & TricksThis painting tip comes courtesy of Dwayne Adams.

One of the issues that bugs most artists is that of having a light condition, or color rendition. Just keep doing that till perfectly good painting and then adding in cars, animals, it starts to fit and look right then render it a couple times or people as part of the final detail. And then...you get it loosely so that you get comfortable with it. At that point wrong—the scale, the color, the posture...you may be able to just render it onto your painting. If

A simple way to lessen the angst is to simply take a scrap you're still tight, take a piece of tracing paper, trace the figure of paper and make some very quick paintings of the detail or object onto the tracing paper. Then take some carbon piece that you intend to paint on the canvas or paper. Make paper and retrace the subject through the carbon paper, a couple candidates that would work and then hold the transferring it onto the actual painting.

figure/object where you think you want it to be located. Watercolor is tough enough to keep loose. Use simple tools Move it around and see if it feels right. No? Then do to lessen the angst.


